Our Own Outdoors Reporter

Mike Brown, from camp #4, writes on outdoors every Friday in the Poughkeepsie Journal. We reprint here his wonderful article from August 5, 1994.

If you seek evidence about how important fishing can be in the long-term spectrum of a productive and balanced life, consider how bonds of lifelong friendship are enhanced by a few hours of angling on a hot summer night.

One of my lifetime friends, Donnie Bruce, has been just as busy with business and family (he and his wife have four girls including a pair of twin dynamos) as I've been over the years. Each midsummer we have worked hard to get together if only for just a single night of fishing in [Crescent Lake] New Hampshire.

Last Friday night was Donnie's 39th birthday (the last one he will officially celebrate) and we both recently changed jobs. So there was plenty to think about and be concerned with during these uncertain times of the 1990s.

Our dreamy midsummer night's adventure started at 10 p.m. after the kids were put to bed and the little New Hampshire night was quiet. We loaded up an old 12-foot fishing boat with his spinning gear, two or three surface lures, a big net, a few cold beverages and our high hopes that the bass would be active on a warm, calm night.

I volunteered to serve as guide and rowed the boat to areas of the lake where together we had first caught bass more than 25 years ago.

At first the action was slow, possibly because recent thunderstorms changed the water levels and temperatures of the lake. But then things picked up.

Before we rowed home at 1 a.m., Donnie brought five nice bass to my net and we lost a couple other hard-fighting fish. If you haven't fished for bass with surface lures on a dark night, you're missing one of the treats of the summer months.

You can't see them, you sometimes don't even feel them, but when a three-pound bass smacks the surface of the water, it certainly gets your attention.

The night before on the same lake, Donnie had caught the biggest bass of his life. The bass weighed just shy of five pounds and made multiple hours of tedious fishing worth the endeavor. But just like a year ago during our annual one-night trek into the darkness, our combined efforts were magical with a fishing rod in hand.

In addition to the five fish on the line, we also shared a conversation with a whitetail deer. The unseen deer, standing on the shore, wasn't sure about the movement of the water and it snorted and "blew" once or twice before I answered with my own responses.

Every time I snorted, the deer would answer on cue. Who knows what creature that deer thought had issued a challenge from the watery surface. We sure were entertained.

In between netting bass we did talk about work, friendship and life. But primarily there was this unspoken communication between two long-time friends that life is sort of like fishing for bass in the middle of the night.

Sometimes you get a good fish on the line. Other times you don't catch anything or get hooked up on an unseen dock. But just being there for the experience, placing yourself in the right position at the right time for success, is more than half the battle.

After all, that's what friends and fishing are all about.

Bass Notes


The following report on our watery friends wins the coveted "first Chronicles contributor" award for Richard Brown. (Thanks, Dick!)

For release: Since the State of New Hampshire hadn't stocked since 1986, we stocked large mouth bass in 1991, 1993, and 1994 so that many of our youth could catch some bigger fighting fish in '95-'96. It's worked! Several of our family or friends' kids have caught 3 or 4 pound bass.

We're teaching catch and release to young and old. A 3pound bass is probably 10 years old and a breeder/hatcher which helps keep our lake "alive!"


